We will also be reading significant portions of my book *From Jim Crow to Civil Rights: The Supreme Court and the Struggle for Racial Equality* (2004), which should be available from the law school bookstore.

The numbers along the left-hand side of the syllabus represent assignments (of which there are 20), rather than class sessions (of which there are 36); most of the reading assignments will occupy us for longer than a single sixty-minute class.
